Haybi's Story in Her Own Words

"El error no es caerse, el error es no levantarse"

"The mistake is not in falling, but in failing to rise again."

I was 12 years old in the Summer of 2019, living in Guatemala, and was the caretaker for my younger siblings.

I can clearly remember the call from my mother, who was living in the United States telling me that I was to take the journey, to join her, with my two younger siblings, by myself. I felt lost and trapped between leaving my home which was unsafe and traveling somewhere new with, so much uncertainty and responsibility.

All I could think about was why me? I had already endured so much adversity. The thought of ending my life seemed like the only solution. As my siblings slept, the silence around was a reminder of the weight of my decision. As I stared into the void, searching for a sign or the perfect moment to end my suffering, my sister's voice unexpectedly pierced the silence.

She asked me to make her favorite sandwich for school the next day. At that moment it hit me, that decision would destroy my siblings. They relied on me, and I couldn't bear the thought of causing them harm. So instead, I made a different choice - to take on the responsibility of bringing them to the U.S.

A journey that was supposed to be seven days, took us three long months, ninety grueling days, and a total of two thousand one hundred and ninety hours. Despite the hardships and challenges along the way, I knew deep down that it was worth it for their well-being and their future. What I did not expect, however, was to begin building a future for myself.

I never expected to gain the confidence and skills to believe in myself and a great future. That journey turned out to be a blessing that led me on a path of self-discovery and personal growth. I have learned to accept and forgive myself and to trust in my ability to make the right decisions. My journey is bigger than me.

My goal is to create a safe atmosphere for club members to explore, grow, and overcome challenges. Drawing from my own experiences, I aim to serve as a mentor and offer support to those who need it, just as the Waltham Boys and Girls Club did for me. Through this program, I hope to inspire and empower everyone to find their voices and embrace their unique journeys.
